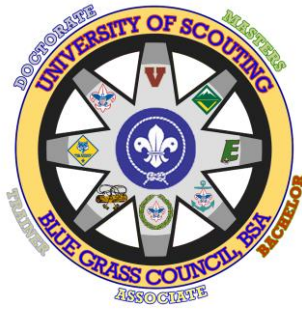

Creating Your Schedule and Registering

General Information

1. You can take up to six hours of courses on any topic that you are interested in learning
OR
2. You can choose to participate in a Degree Program for the College of your choice. To do this you must meet the Degree Eligibility Requirements and register for classes required by the degree you choose. See the *Explanation of the University of Scouting Degree Program* before choosing your classes.

Registration Process

1. Complete the **registration form** on page 13 as soon as possible! **Course sizes are limited** and will be filled on a first come, first served basis. If you wait until the last minute, you might not get the class you want.
2. **Decide if you would like to earn or work towards a degree or not** and then choose courses that you wish to attend. Review the list of courses offered and select your classes (1st choice and 2 alternatives) for any session you plan to attend. Remember to *pay particular attention to classes selected if you have chosen to work on a degree.*
3. Register online at www.bgScouting.org or mail, fax, email or bring your **registration form and fee** to Blue Grass Council, BSA, ATTN: University of Scouting, 3445 Richmond Rd. Lexington, KY 40509. Please register early. **Classes are subject to cancellation if not enough interest is shown.** You may also fax the application with your credit card information to the council office at (859) 252-3785 or email the information to SusanAnn.Stone@Scouting.org.

Explanation of the University of Scouting Degree Program

It is not necessary to work toward a degree at the University of Scouting. Just register for whichever classes you desire and come to have fun and learn whether you are in a degree program or not.

The Blue Grass Council is pleased to announce that in association with the University of Scouting Program that the University of Scouting will be offering an Associate and Bachelor Degree in Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, General Scouting and Commissioner Science. A Master Degree and Doctorate Degree are available in Scouting and Commissioner Science.

Degree Eligibility General Requirements for all degrees:

- Must be a registered member of the Scouting program
- Must have completed Youth Protection Training, available on-line at <https://myScouting.Scouting.org>
- Must have completed Leader Specific Training for your current position in Scouting.
- The degree program began at the 2005 University of Scouting, therefore only courses taken from 2005 forward count toward your degree.

Requirements for Associate Degree (except Commissioner Science):

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.
- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Complete **two core** courses required for Bachelor Degree
- Complete **two required** courses required for Bachelor Degree
- Complete **one elective** course from any College

Requirements for Bachelor's Degree (except Commissioner Science):

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.

- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Complete **four core** courses required for Bachelor Degree
- Complete **four required** courses required for Bachelor Degree
- Complete **two elective** courses in any College.

Requirements for Master's Degree of Scouting:

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.
- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Completion of Bachelor Degree
- Completion of 5 additional courses beyond the Bachelor Degree requirements selected from the courses on the Master's level.
- Serve on the University of Scouting faculty for at least one year.
- Serve as Course Director for one of the following for your district or council: Training Development Course, Trainer's E.D.G.E., Outdoor Leader Training (WLOT or OLS), BALOO, or ASM/SM Specific Training or serve on Wood Badge Staff.
- Complete a research project on any topic of value to the Blue Grass Council. Project must be approved by the Dean of the College of Boy Scouting or Cub Scouting and the Council Staff Advisor to the University of Scouting.

Requirements for Doctorate Degree of Scouting:

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.
- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Completion of a Masters Degree
- Awarded Scouter's Key Award
- Completion of 10 additional courses of instruction (total 25) with at least 5 of the courses at the Master's program level.
- Completion of a thesis or research project on any topic of value to Scouting in the local council. The topic and final paper must be approved by the Chancellor of the University of Scouting and the Council Staff Advisor to the University of Scouting.
- Approval of the appropriate district committee chair (or district commissioner, if the degree applicant is the district committee chair) and the appropriate district executive.

Commissioner of Science Degrees

Requirements for Associate Degree:

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.
- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Complete **two core** courses required for Bachelor Degree
- Complete **two required** courses from required Commissioner Science class list (200-299)

Requirements for Bachelor's Degree:

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.
- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Current registration as a Commissioner
- Complete **four core** courses required for Bachelor Degree
- Complete **four** courses from required Commissioner Science class list (200-299)
- Complete **two** courses from the elective Commissioner Science class list (300-399)

Requirements for Master's Degree of Commissioner Science:

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.
- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Current registration as a Commissioner

- Completion of Bachelor Degree
- Completion of Commissioner's Key
- Earned Arrowhead Honor
- Completion of 5 additional courses beyond the Bachelor Degree requirements selected from the courses on the Master's level.
- Serve on the University of Scouting faculty for at least one year.
- Serve as Course Director for one of the following for your district or council: Training Development Course, Trainer's E.D.G.E., Outdoor Leader Training (WLOT or OLS), BALOO, ASM/SM Specific Training, or Commissioner Conference.
- Complete a research project on any topic of value to the Blue Grass Council. Project must be approved by the Dean of the College of Commissioner Science and the Council Staff Advisor to the University of Scouting.

Requirements for Doctorate Degree of Commissioner Science:

- You must have earned a trained patch for your registered position to be eligible for degrees.
- Complete all Degree Eligibility General Requirements
- Current registration as a Commissioner and have served in the commissioner's service for at least 5 years.
- Completion of a Masters Degree
- Awarded the Commissioner's Key
- Completion of 10 additional courses of instruction (total 24) with at least 5 of the courses at the Doctor's program level.
- Completion of a thesis or research project on any topic of value to Scouting in the local council. The topic and final paper must be approved by the Chancellor of the University of Scouting and the Council Staff Advisor to the University of Scouting.
- Must recruit at least 3 new commissioners
- Approval of the district commissioner (if the degree applicant is the district commissioner for their district, the council commissioner must give approval) and the appropriate district executive.

Records of previous year's University of Scouting will be provided upon request. To request your record, call the council office.
